Project Name: Afterschool @ Your Library - Technology

Summary: The Broward County Library's after school program Afterschool@yourlibrary provides a safe, positive environment for underserved area youth that enhances academic achievement, the development of social skills and increases use of and access to computer technology. In its fifth year, the free program is open to 450 six to twelve year olds, after school, four days per week at fifteen library locations. This project will provide laptop computers and software at twelve sites that currently offer only limited computer access for these children. This access to technology is critical to giving these youth adequate opportunities to develop the computer skills critical to academic success.

Summary: Gadsden County Public Library's Books on Wheels project will replace the current 1991 twenty-five foot long bookmobile with a thirty foot long bookmobile, and add three public access computers with web access. The online circulation system will be available on the new bookmobile and the new bookmobile will be wheelchair accessible. The bookmobile will improve access to library services to residents in this rural are of North Florida.

Summary: These LSTA funds will allow the Jacksonville Public Library to sustain and expand vital adult literacy services for a third year by supporting and training volunteer tutors to work with English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) and special needs learners. The development, use and dissemination of the Fast Track Reading System (loosely based upon the Wilson Reading System) for lower-level readers remains a product of this initiative. This project will also develop a training module (including recorded demonstrations of classroom instruction) and mass-produce instructional materials for state-wide dissemination of the Fast Track Reading System) Two partners (Learn to Read, Inc. of Jacksonville and Learn to Read of St. Johns County, Inc.) will assist the Jacksonville Public Library in continuing and expanding this curriculum.

Summary: The Marion County Public Library System’s project, Keys to Access: Window on the World, will provide training and assistive technology to assist persons with disabilities and developmental challenges to use library services. The library will work with the local workforce board to help jobseekers with disabilities by providing assistive technology and by educating employers on the value of hiring people with disabilities. Sensitivity training will provide a greater understanding by others of the challenges encountered by this targeted group.

Using a coordinated approach to equal access, this project will ensure the availability of assistive technology at all library branches and will update, upgrade and augment assistive technology that was installed at five of the larger library branches through a 2001 LSTA grant. It will also provide adaptive toys for children with special needs at two additional branch libraries, expanding a component of the Born to Read program begun with LSTA grant funding in 2006. Training in the use of these toys will also be provided for children, families, staff and community partners. The partners for this program will include the North Central Florida Center for Independent Living, Inter-County Council of the Blind, Florida Diagnostic & Learning Resource Systems (FDLRS), Marion County Literacy Council, CLM Workforce Connection, and the Marion County Children’s Alliance’ Children with Autism & Other Disabilities Work Group. These partners will provide referral and promotional assistance as well as support services to the target population. Through this program, the library will also offer training to library staff, local employers, patrons and community organizations to increase awareness of challenges and resources available to people with disabilities.

Summary: The New River Public Library Cooperative will buy computer equipment to enhance the mobile computer training lab. This will increase the ability of the Cooperative to provide hands on computer training to adults who are unable to use computers, and to teach middle and high school students about safe Internet usage. The training will be provided by a part time teacher hired to supervise the project, and in partnership with the Union County Public Library, the local school system and the sheriff's office.

Summary: The Orange County Library System will offer tutoring and FCAT assistance through the use of technology to low-income, at risk students in grades 3-5 in areas of Orange County accessible to this target group. The library will partner with the City of Orlando's Department of Families, Parks and Recreation and seven of its after school programs: Northwest Community Center, Ivey Lane Community Center, Callahan Neighborhood Center, Jackson Community Center, Rock Lake Community Center, Rosemont Community Center, and Engelwood Neighborhood Center. Library Staff will purchase 18 laptops to supplement 12 laptops in the Library already owns to create three mobile labs (two labs of 12 and one lab of 6). Librarians and Technology and Customer Support Specialists (TCCS's) will bring these laptops to the after school programs. Seven times per week, Librarians will assist children in accessing tutoring software and preparing for the FCAT, while TCSS's will help with the equipment and software use. The partnering organizations will provide the facilities and furniture, as well as help with reaching target audiences and evaluating the effectiveness of the program. Library staff will also create online classes for children in grades 3-5 that will be placed on the library's website.

Utilizing a bookmobile, books-by-mail, a core group of trained volunteers and the establishment of several deposit collections serving 7 afterschool centers, 3 licensed day care centers, 5 recreation and parks centers, 2 year round community centers, 1 high school serving new and expecting teen moms, 1 Adult and Family Literacy Center and 27 senior serving facilities, the Library hopes to make a difference in the lives of people of all ages who, due to barriers such as: age, distance, immobility, safety, lack of transportation, poverty, lack of supervision of limited education do not have access to a library.

The intent of the project is to provide an online platform and focal point for gathering, preserving and disseminating the documents, artifacts and stories of the history of Central Florida. The purpose of this project is to add two new participants, Stetson University and Bethune-Cookman University in order to expand coverage to include Volusia County as well as the African American community of early Central Florida., This grant will make possible the addition of up to 30,000 images of photographs and visual ephemera that enhance the visual story of Central Florida by giving institutions the opportunity to have materials described and digitized by project staff and providing a digital home to those archives unable to establish their own digital infrastructure

Sustainability will include creating a digital archive of classes for use by library patrons on demand.

- 2) Exploration of expanding iBorrow into the SEFLIN region serving Southeast Florida.

The library provides information services for State of Florida officials and agency employees; supplements the services and collections of libraries throughout Florida through interlibrary loan, resource sharing, reference services, and cataloging of State of Florida documents; and develops its collections to ensure that Floridians have access to information about Florida's past, present and future. Resource sharing through interlibrary loan is essential to Florida libraries. Resource sharing allows libraries statewide to have timely access to accurate and relevant information. The State Library of Florida is the library of the first resort for interlibrary loan requests from Florida libraries that do not use OCLC, and the library of last resort for interlibrary loan requests from Florida libraries that use OCLC for interlibrary loan. The State Library receives interlibrary loan request electronically through OCLC, by fax, email, phone and mail. The State Library contracts with OCLC, Sirs/Dynix and Re:Discovery for systems support needed for interlibrary loan and resource sharing activities. Activities performed by State Library staff for interlibrary loan and resource sharing include collecting appropriate materials for its special and circulating collections, processing interlibrary loan requests, adding material to the State Library online catalog, verifying correct State Library holdings information is listed in statewide databases, and ensuring that online services are available to on-site and remote users at all times.
